You can research online: guide **IRS** for veteran's organizations, IRS auditor's guidelines, Legion 990 compliance, and Post Operations Guides. Each Post receives a copy of the Post Commander's Guide Adjutant's Guide annually. Each Post needs to review the quidelines and comply.

Membership:

For the 2022 year – Our goal for the year is 15,585. The February 9th goal is 85%. The March 9th goal is 90%. We need your help to stay on goal. REMEMBER: YOUR MEMBERS THAT FAILED TO RENEW BY DECEMBER 31 ARE IN DEFAULT STATUS.

Poppy Fund: Funds derived from Poppy sales are the funds we can use for Children & Youth programs and Temporary Financial Assistance. The goal is at least \$0.50 per member. Posts of 200 or less should donate at least \$25; Posts over 200 should donate at least \$40.00.

<u>Post Data Form</u>: This is a mandatory form from National. The forms are being sent to each Post via USPS mail. They are due to Department by April 15, 2022.

Post Officer Certification Form: This is a mandatory form to be completed and sent to Department following the Post spring elections.

Consolidated Post Report: This is a mandatory form. Please return to Department not later than June 1, 2022, so Department can get them to National by July 1, 2022. The information on this report is what National uses to compile and information provide Congress. Every active Post does something for Veterans, the Community, and/or Youth. Easy to fill out, please report! The form is available online at Legion.org and are being sent to the Posts in the January mailout.

From Department Chaplain Gerald Theriot

We have been attending a lot of funerals lately. The question of how to wear the Legion cap comes up often.

Legion protocol for cap etiquette is provided below from the Legion Emblem Sales catalog. Legion members, in a group, should decide how they will wear the cap during viewing and funerals. In no case should a cap be worn in a church or venue after a service starts. If possible, ensure that you are in agreement with the wishes of the presiding officiant.



CAP ETIQUETTE

The left side (emblem side) of the cap is reserved only for the Legion emblem, city, district, or state lettering.

If desired, the following items must be placed on the side of the right cap: Additional lettering, (A) restricted to either the name of a Post, or to an officer title (such "Past Commander"); (B) Cap insignias or badges (For Past or Present officers); (C) Consecutive membership insignia, membership stars, and/or authorized Legion or military services decorations.

Names or nicknames of individual members cannot be used on caps.

The Legion Uniform Cap should be worn only by its members when in attendance at official Legion meetings or ceremonies, or as official guests at patriotic or other civil functions, or by individuals when officially representing The American Legion on public occasions.

A member is considered to be in uniform if wearing an official Legion cap. Therefore, it is not proper to wear the cap while eating a meal at an official Legion or civic luncheon or dinner.

A cap should be worn in a place of worship only by the Guard of Honor, Color Guard and Commander of same while

in marching order or standing guard. When returned to and seated in pews, the cap should be removed.

Legion members not in formation will uncover upon entering the place of worship and remain uncovered during the entire service and will cover again after leaving the place of worship.

Legion Posts marching in formation into a place of worship should uncover, at the door, hold the cap with the right hand over the heart until the the pews arrival in and commanded to take seats, remaining uncovered during the entire service. At the close of the service, upon command, the Post shall arise, the members holding the cap with the right hand over the heart will march out of the place of worship and recover after marching through the door.

Legion members not in formation will uncover upon entering the place of worship and remain uncovered during the entire service and will recover after leaving the place of worship.

When at a funeral, the cap should be held over the heart as one approaches the casket, and is not at any time worn in a place of worship (except by the Guard of Honor, Color Guard or Commander of same while in marching order or At the standing guard). graveside, the cap should be held in the right hand over the heart during the entire service. In cold and inclement weather, the cap should not be worn.

In Legion meetings, the cap should be worn except during moments of the Pledge of Allegiance, prayer, and when standing in silent reverence in memory of departed comrades, when the cap should be held with the right hand over the heart.

Female members of the Legion should wear their caps in the manner prescribed for female personnel of the armed services.

A Word - From the Editors

From "Chicken Soup for the Veteran's Soul" - A Valentine Story

During a visit to her parents in West Virginia, Sarah H. Giachino decided to explore their attic. They had lived in the home since 1953, so investigating the attic was a trip down memory lane for Mrs. Giachino. Pulling down the folding steps and then climbing the unstable ladder to the dusty, cold, wood-planked

space, she looked around and noticed a very old, barrel-shaped covered basket in the corner. Opening the lid of the basket, she was pleased to find it filled with old letters her parents wrote to each other during World War II. The letters had sat there in the basket, faded and dirty, untouched since the day they had been tossed there.

Mrs. Giachino thought it seems such a shame to just leave them that way and decided to ask her parents if she could take the letters back to her home to read and organize them by day and month. They agreed and soon after returning home, she started her little project. As she opened each letter, all of them delicate with age, she discovered a new previously unrevealed page in this private chapter of her parents' lives. Her father had served in the Army as a first lieutenant, 117th Infantry, in the 30th Division. His letters were full of frontline accounts of landing on Omaha Beach and continued all the way through the Battle of the Bulge. He wrote about his daily experiences with civilians, German POWs, refugees, foxholes, helmet baths, and more. Each of her mother's letters was sealed with her 1944 magenta lipstick kiss. Her dad wrote that he sealed his return letters by rekissing her lipstick kiss. This ritual filled a void in their lonely, war-torn lives.

After reading six months of the letters, Mrs. Giachino discovered there were at least eleven months of letters missing and promised herself she would look for them on the next visit. Just six weeks after her initial visit, Mrs. Giachino's father became very ill. This time, he was fighting a different kind of war – a new prescription for arthritis had been introduced to his system and had almost killed him. Since he was scheduled for kidney dialysis while on her return visit, Mrs. Giachino discussed the letters with her father. He told her how much receiving those lipstick-kissed letters had meant to him when he had been so far from home.

Leaving his side, the thought raced through her mind that the next day was Valentine's Day, but since her father wasn't in any kind of shape to shop for a valentine, her mother would understand that her valentine would just have to be skipped that year. Her parents had been married for 56 years. Later that evening, she and her mother revisited the attic in search of the lost letters and began digging through a large 60-year-old trunk. Under tattered clothes and toward the bottom was an unmarked gold cardboard box. Holding their breath, they slowly lifted off the top and saw the missing letters. Lying on top separately was a large envelope and inside was the valentine card Mrs. Giachino's father had sent her mother in 1944. The next day she and her mother visited her father and handed him the old envelope. He carefully opened the card and when he recognized it, his eyes filled with tears. In a voice quavering with emotion, he read the loving message he'd sent to his wife 56 years earlier...and this time, he could read it to her for Valentine's Day in person.
